
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
So a "Call to Worship" is a way to attract someone's attention for prayer

The Bar'chu usually uses a "symbol-word" twice:



We don't read that word like it's written.

It stands for a name that is

so super-duper holy

That we don't write it out just in case the book or piece of paper gets thrown out.

Judaism has a very uncreative method of naming most of our Hebrew prayers: we pick the first word of the prayer and make that the name of it.

Most Jewish prayers are either

Personal Prayers

Can still be said along with a community...

...but talk about ideas that are of a personal and individual nature, not for the whole Jewish people.

For example: a prayer for healing, or a prayer for wisdom.

Communal Prayers

Can still be said when alone...

...but talk about ideas that are of a communal and group-related nature, not just for one person.

For example: a prayer for rain, or a prayer to remember our ancestors.

Most Jewish prayers are either

Personal Prayers

PRO TIP:

Look for "I" and "me" in the translation – it's likely this is a personal prayer! or

Communal Prayers

PRO TIP:

Look for "we" and "us" or mentions of the "people of Israel" in the translation – this could be a communal prayer!

T'fillah Taxonomy

Plenty of Jewish prayers are a little bit of both


Personal and Communal
